DEVELOPMENT MATTERS — STEPS TO SUCCESS



Good hand-eye coordination - the ability to communicate between the brain and the hand to make the desired marks.

Crossing the midline - the ability to be able to cross the imaginary line that runs from the top of the head to the toes, straight down the middle of the body

Using both hands/feet together - for example, to hold the paper with one hand while writing with the other

Good core strength - having strong core muscles means that children can sit up comfortably to write

Good muscle tone - well developed muscles in the neck, shoulders, arms, hands and fingers are essential for writing

Use a range of tools - using a range of tools develops a wide variety of muscles

Have experience of making marks - any marks! From painting to using chalks, pencils to felt tips

Use fingers individually - fingers make subtly different, individual movements to enable us to make the marks we need.














DOUGH DISCO & SQUIGGLE WRIGGLE



Squiggle While You Wiggle is a kinaesthetic approach to stimulate early **writing**. ... Through **Squiggle While You Wiggle**, children begin using 'Flipper Flappers' to rehearse a range of shapes, which lead to children mark-making with chunky pens, in preparation for more formal **writing**.










4 AND 5 YEAR OLDS



When children show an interest in writing, we support them to make marks and give them meaning, or to copy their name, modelling correctly formed letters and the sounds that they make, but we NEVER force them to write before they are ready! A strong foundation in prewriting skills and fostering a love of words is the very best thing we can do to create writers of the future.

THE PENCIL GRIP SONG


My thumb is bent,

Pointer points to the tip,










SKY — GRASS — UNDERGROUND


