## What to do if you are concerned about a child's safety or welfare.

If you are concerned about a child's safety or welfare, please contact the school office on **01429 83857 or em**ail <u>adminoffice @alton-inf.hants.sch.uk</u> so that they can immediately find a Designated Safeguarding Lead for you to talk to.

Alternatively you can call Hampshire Children's Services on 0300 5551384 or the Police.

Equally, if your concerns relate to the actions or behaviour of a member of staff (which could suggest that s/he is unsuitable to work with children) please ask to speak to a DSL in confidence, who will refer the matter to the Headteacher (or the Chair of Governors if the concern relates to the Headteacher) and procedures will be followed.
